ADMINISTRATIVE REPORT – 10-YEAR CAPITAL – SCHOOL RENEWAL PROJECT PLAN

OCTOBER 17, 2018

Purpose:

To provide the Board with the 10-Year Capital - School Renewal Project Plan for the period 2018-2019 to 2027-2028 and to make a recommendation for approval.

Background:

Starting in 2011-2012 the Board has prepared a 10-Year Capital - School Renewal Project Plan (the plan) that is updated each year. The purpose of the plan is to highlight proposed school renewal project activities under the following project types:

Heating/Mechanical Systems Energy/Controls Site Improvements Code/Regulatory Security Electrical/Lighting Communication Systems Accessibility Small Capital Building Envelope (e.g. Roofing, Windows, Doors, Structure)

Approved Budget

At the June 20, 2018 Board Meeting the 2018-2019 Budget was approved including a capital budget consisting of \$17.0 million in School Renewal funded projects as follows:

School Renewal	\$ 4,179,692
School Condition Improvements	11,525,410

The 2018-2019 Budget contained a preliminary plan of renewal projects by school or various schools to highlight how the \$17.0 million would be invested.

Funding Announcement

On July 5, 2018, the Ministry announced that the provincial Cap and Trade program has been cancelled. As the Greenhouse Gas Reduction Program (GGRP) is funded through the Cap and Trade proceeds, this program is also cancelled effective July 3, 2018.

Limestone District School Board is situated on traditional territories of the Anishinaabe & Haudenosaunee.

As such, school boards were advised not to enter into any further contracts under the GGRP after July 3, 2018. The Ministry also stated that they would cover the project costs incurred if boards have entered into GGRP contractual agreements on or before July 3, 2018.

Limestone DSB submitted two GGRP projects totaling \$1,280,600 for boiler/exhaust upgrades at LaSalle Secondary School and LCVI that had contracts signed prior to the July 3, 2018 timeline, for Ministry consideration and approval. We understand that the Ministry will be notifying the Board by the end of October 2018 if costs for these two GGRP projects will be covered.

Observation/Analysis:

The Facility Services Department has developed the 10-year school renewal project plan based upon the VFA Building Condition reports for all schools; analysis from maintenance work orders; knowledge from facilities trades and maintenance staff, and expertise from engineering and other consultants.

The 10-year plan includes an updated 2018-2019 listing of \$16,985,702 projects by school or various schools, assuming the \$1,280,600 in GGRP projects will be funded. Project work estimates are based upon best available information at the time.

For the 2019-2020 to 2027-2028-school years, the 10-year plan includes an estimated \$4,200,000 in proposed annual school renewal project activity based upon prior year Ministry funding levels. This plan may/will change to reflect actual Ministry school renewal funding levels when announced.

Recommendations:

That the Board:

- Approve the 10-Year Capital School Renewal Project Plan for 2018-2019 to 2027-2028.
- That a copy of the 10-Year Capital School Renewal Project Plan be posted on the Board's website.

Education Policy & Operations Committee EQUITY: STUDENT VOICE PROJECT

OCTOBER 17, 2018.

Purpose:

To provide Trustees with an overview of the ongoing work related to the Equity Action Plan. Specifically, this report shares an overview of the Student Voice Project conducted in May 2018.

Background:

Ontario's Education Equity Action Plan released in 2017 builds on the Ministry of Education's 2009 strategy, Realizing the Promise of Diversity: Ontario's Equity and Inclusive Education Strategy. Equity is necessary to realizing the goals of Achieving Excellence: A Renewed Vision for Education in Ontario (2014). Equity work continues to be critical if we are to identify and eliminate discriminatory practices, systemic barriers and bias from schools and classrooms to support the potential for all students to succeed.

The Ministry of Education offered boards of education funding through an application process to support capacity building in providing safe and accepting learning environments for students, with a focus on students who identify as LGBTQ+, Indigenous, or Racialized.

Project Objectives:

- To collect the voices of racialized / marginalized/ Indigenous students and staff from LDSB secondary schools;
- To analyze barriers to racialized / marginalized / Indigenous student well-being and achievement so that educators can begin to remove barriers in schools and to move towards ensuring that school and classroom practices reflect and respond to the diversity of students and staff.

In May, Suchetan James, a teacher at Frontenac Secondary School, organized a one-day Student Voice event. Secondary student representatives from across the district came together with staff facilitators and spent the day responding to questions that helped to elicit their personal educational journey stories. These narratives were analysed in order to identify themes and areas for further work and support.

Current Status:

Some examples of themes emerging from the work included students sharing the need for opportunities to meet with students who self-identify as LGBTQ+, Indigenous or racialized. Students identified staff discomfort in understanding and using appropriate language. Students shared a lack of connection to the classroom

experience due to a lack of relevance and a need for more inclusive instruction.

Students recognized the efforts of staff to be inclusive. In general, students expressed that their secondary school experience has been a more positive experience than their elementary one, but that there is still work to be done to create safe and inclusive spaces in schools.

In conclusion, students and staff involved in the project offered several recommendations to the Board for consideration.

That the Board...

- 1. Provide more and regular mandatory professional development training for all staff and K 12 teachers in social equity, anti-racism and cultural competency.
- 2. Adopt a K 12 gender neutral policy that includes the creation of gender-neutral bathrooms in all schools, the adoption of non-gendered language by staff and teachers in all curricular documents for discussions in class, and for non-gendered sports and sporting activities.
- 3. Provide schools with a range of student resources and more guest speakers that support learning and growth in a safe and welcoming space that recognizes and respects LBGTQ+, Indigenous and Racialized youth.
- 4. Increase mental health and well-being support training for K 12 educational support workers, counsellors and administrators with a focus on LGBTQ+, Indigenous and Racialized content.
- 5. Organize regular Student Voice Day Events in schools where students who identify as LGBTQ+, Indigenous and Racialized can have opportunities to share their personal stories and experiences in a safe, welcoming and supportive space and that these events occur no less than twice each school calendar year.

Next Steps:

The Senior Staff and the Equity Advisory Committee will review the recommendations and plan for ongoing training and support.

ADMINISTRATIVE REPORT

ELECTRONICS COMMUNICATIONS STRATEGY

OCTOBER 17, 2018

Purpose:

To provide Trustees with an update on the implementation of various electronic communication tools to support and enable students, families, staff and the broader community to stay informed about district and school news and events.

Background:

Communications and Information Technology Staff began a lengthy process to update the Board and school websites in June 2017 with the goal to create more engaging and user-friendly websites. The new websites include accessibility requirements, Google translate (80+ languages), and improved search functions and analytics. All school websites follow a similar template so that students, families and staff moving between schools will be able to easily find information in the same location.

After careful consideration and analysis, the Board opted to engage vendor School Messenger/WEST due to the ability to introduce an entire suite of electronic communications tools to ensure smooth integration and functionality across all platforms.

These additional tools include:

- An enhanced broadcasting tool called Communicate (formerly Synrevoice) that allows the Board and schools to push important messages to students, families, and staff via voice mail, email or text message.
- A new two-way absence reporting tool to make it easier for families to report student absences.
- A new cashless payment system that will allow families to pay for field trips, hot lunches and other items online.

Current Status:

Mobile app: The Board mobile app was introduced at the beginning of the 2018-2019 school year. The free app, which can be downloaded for Apple and Android devices, allows users to subscribe to their preferred schools allowing them to receive news and event updates in real time. All users automatically receive Board news and events by default. Users can also select "push notifications" when they download the app to receive emergency alerts or updates as required.

Safe Arrival: Southview Public School in Napanee began a pilot of the enhanced Safe Arrival absence-reporting tool in September 2018. The enhanced system makes it easier for families to report student absences, reduces the time it takes for school staff to verify student attendance, and responds to unexpected or unplanned student absences. This time savings makes it faster and more efficient to account for all students and their safety. Safe Arrival allows users to report absences using a mobile app, a website, or an interactive toll-free phone number to report an absence in advance. These options are available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. Future absences can be reported at any time. The system requires all schools to use a web attendance feature. Training on this module is being completed throughout the October and November with an aim to have all schools using Safe Arrival by the end of 2018.

Communicate: Training is currently under way for the enhanced Communicate broadcast tool. The tool is linked to the Board's student information system and families will choose how they wish to receive these important messages (text message, email or voice mail). Some schools who previously used Synrevoice (mostly secondary schools) began using Communicate at the start of the new school year in September. All schools will introduce the tool later this fall, with everyone online by the end of 2018.

Cashless Schools: The Board introduce an online payment and permissions portal that allows families to pay for field trips, hot lunches and other items online. Families can make payments using debit or credit card. Accommodations will always be considered for those who require them. The system will also allow schools to include any necessary permission forms to increase efficiency and privacy. Some schools in the Greater Napanee area will begin piloting this new system in late November/early December. Each family of schools will be brought online over the next couple of years.
